SOME ADDITIONAL DATA

- In the past ten years, A Woman's Place staff members have answered 7,751 crisis phone calls.
- During 2022, AWP provided safe shelter and advocacy for 385 individuals.
- AWP gave 116 presentations on domestic violence and teen dating violence in Weld County in 2022.
- 60 percent of the advocates at AWP are bilingual. We provided services to survivors in 9 languages.
- AWP is an inclusive organization and does not discriminate based on gender, culture, race, sexual identity, or religious beliefs.

OUR HISTORY



In 1977, A Woman's Place opened up a crisis line for victims/survivors of domestic violence. Then in 1981, the leaders of AWP then opened a safehouse where survivors of domestic violence could stay for safe shelter and support. This was a huge task made possible because of the help from the Greeley Urban Renewal Authority (GURA) and many local businesses and families. A house was donated to the agency, but in order to physically move the house many power lines and traffic signals had to be taken down and adjusted for the house to make it down the streets to its final location. Opening the safehouse was a huge undertaking!

Once completed, A Woman's Place was able to help more survivors of domestic violence with safe shelter, support, and resources. Thanks to generous donations from GURA, in 2013 the shelter received needed renovations updating the client kitchen and other living areas.

Forty five years later, the safehouse continues to provide safe shelter to survivors of domestic violence. The work of A Woman's Place continues to be made possible through the generous support of many local businesses and families. A Woman's Place continues to be a critical Weld County lifeline believing that "Everyone deserves to live a life that is free from violence."

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE



WHAT IS DOMESTIC VIOLENCE?

Domestic violence or "intimate partner violence" can be described as a pattern of behavior in any relationship to gain and maintain control over a partner. The forms of abuse vary from physical, emotional, sexual, and economic. Abuse also involves threats, manipulation, isolation, and humiliation. Domestic violence does not discriminate and can happen to anyone of any race, gender, sexual orientation or age.

STATISTICS FROM THE NATIONAL COALITION AGAINST DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

- In the United States, on average, nearly 20 people per minute are physically abused by an intimate partner (10 million women and men annually).
- 1 in 4 women and 1 in 7 men have been victims of severe physical violence (e.g. beating, burning, strangling) by an intimate partner in their lifetime.
- On a typical day, there are more than 20,000 phone calls placed to domestic violence hotlines nationwide.
- Physical, mental, and sexual and reproductive health effects have been linked with intimate partner violence including unintended pregnancy, miscarriage, stillbirth, intrauterine hemorrhage, nutritional deficiency, abdominal pain, gastrointestinal problems, neurological disorders, chronic pain, disability, anxiety and posttraumatic stress disorder (PTSD), hypertension, cancer and cardiovascular disease.
